Simple present

We use the present simple when we talk about everyday actions and routines

I, you, we, they + infinitive:

I **play** football on Mondays.

You **eat** cornflakes for breakfast.

We **read** books at school.

They **go** shopping every day.

3rd person singular

He, she, it + infinitive + s

He **plays** tennis on Sundays.

She often **walks** home.

It usually **eats** fish.

Don't add an s to the verb when the sentence is formed with the auxiliary verbs can / must:

He **must eat** eat. She **can read** read.

Verbs ending with o, sh or ch: add es to the verb.

I go - He **goes**

I wash - She **washes**

You catch - It **catches**

y becomes ies:

I try - He **tries**

In the simple present tense, negative forms are made using the auxiliary verb do + not + infinitive:

I **don't** (do not) eat.

You **don't** (do not) eat.

He / she / it **doesn't** (does not) eat.

We **don't** (do not) eat.

You **don't** (do not) eat.

They **don't** (do not) eat.

Yes/no questions: the auxiliary verb is placed before the subject:

Do I play tennis? Yes, I **do**. / No, I **don't**.

Do you play tennis? Yes, you **do**. / No, you **don't**.

Does she play tennis? Yes, she **does**. / No, she **doesn't**.

It can also be something a person usually does not do. These are the signal words: never, sometimes, often, usually, always, every day.

I **sleep** every *night*.

You **never play** tennis.

He/ she/ it *often* **drinks** water.

We *always* **get up** at 6 o'clock.

They *sometimes* **listen** to music.
